'Healthy is not boring'

Bengaluru: Bhoomi College in Sarjapur is striving to develop a meaningful and inspiring learning environment that tackles the challenges of environmentally and socially conscious lifestyles in the modern world. The College, in partnership with Savera Naturals, a natural farming initiative, held a session on art and fireless cooking as part of their program.

The workshop held on Saturday included the founders of Savera Naturals, Merwin Fernandes and Regina Fernandes sharing their insight on holistic plant-based nutrition to heal and reverse chronic diseases naturally and attain prime health.

Highlighting importance of healthy eating, Merwin Fernandes, said, "There is always a notion that healthy cooking is boring, not tasty, and lacks variety, whereas when it comes to plant-based food and nutritious eating, the sky is the limit. With them, you get real flavours and variety. I think we don't recognise the taste of the fruits and vegetables that we consume. Hence, to bring back the natural taste and natural nutrients is the goal."

Fernandes further stressed on the need for youngsters to make the right choices when it comes to eating and not blame the genes or fate. "We live in modern times where despite wealth and a better standard of living, societies are heavily malnourished. There is an excess of calories, but a total deficit of nutrients, which leads to diseases becoming a norm."

Protest calls for restoring peace in Manipur

Bengaluru: The silence of the chief minister of Manipur on the question of imposing president's rule and the prime minister touring the world whilst the people of the state continue to suffer were questioned by Margaret Alva, the Governor former Rajasthan during a peaceful protest held in Bengaluru.

On July 15, the All Karnataka United Forum Christian Human Rights (AKUFCHR) held a demonstration at Freedom Park to voice support for the victims of violence in Manipur, which continues to be torn apart due to an ethnic conflict between Meities and Kukis that broke out on May 3. The demonstration, attended by a large number of citizens, religious leaders other community leaders, witnessed passionate speeches and calls for

immediate action to address the situation in Manipur.

Highlighting the urgency of the situation and the importance of community engagement, Alva said that the violence in Manipur has reached alarming levels, and the public cannot turn a blind eye to the suffering of their fellow citizens.

"We unite in solidarity to send a strong message to the authorities that enough is enough. It is time for immediate action to bring peace and restore justice in Manipur," she added.

Archbishop, Peter Machado, stressed the significance of helping the people of Manipur, who are

in great need. He commended schools and colleges for their efforts in offering free housing and education to the affected. He also highlighted the importance of praying for political figures who have taken action to assist the victims and lauded religious leaders across different faiths who attended the event.

He further said, "Our nation is like an entire body, and if one finger is broken, the entire body will suffer. Therefore, if Manipur is currently hurting, the entire country is actually suffering."

The demonstration further brought into focus the recent acts of violence and persecution people and communities in Manipur have been subjected to. Participants carried placards and posters with messages like "Peace for Manipur," "Marching for Harmony," "Manipur Citizens' Lives Matter" and many more. They chanted slogans demanding an end to the bloodshed.

The protest sparked media and public discussions on peace and justice in Manipur, with participants hoping for collective change and restoration of harmony and security.

The fiftieth meeting of the **▲** Goods and Services Tax (GST) Council, marked a significant step in India's tax reform journey. The Council made several key decisions aimed at enhancing the tax system, supporting various sectors, and addressing pressing economic challenges.

The GST Appellate Tribunal will start operating on August 1, 2023, with rules for appointing its president and members recommended the Council. The provisions of the Finance Act, 2023 regarding the Tribunal will be notified by the Centre Limited, with a possibility of

for smooth functioning. The chief secretary of Maharashtra will be part of the Search cum selection committee as per Section 110(4)(b)(iii) of the CGST Act, 2017.

The Council focused on uniform taxation in cinema halls by standardising the GST rate for food and beverages served there, benefiting consumers and the cinema industry.

In a bid to support startups, the Council exempted GST on satellite launch services provided by ISRO, Antrix Corporation Limited, and New Space India extension to private sector vehicles were revised to organisations.

Another significant decision was made to add RBL Bank and ICBC Bank to the list of entities exempted from Integrated Goods and Services Tax (IGST). This move aims to reduce transaction costs and stimulate banking and financial activities.

To generate revenue for compensating states considering health implications, the Council rationalised and increased the compensation cess on items like pan masala and tobacco products.

promote sustainable practices, amending the compensation cess notification to encompass specific criteria for eligible vehicles.

The National Policy for Rare Diseases, 2021, and certain imports for personal use, including Dinutuximab (Quarziba) medication and medications for treating rare diseases, were considered in the Council.
