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#### Nagaland to get \$68m edu **loan** from World Bank

ndia and the Nagaland government signed a .\$68-million deal — titled the Nagaland: Enhancing Classroom Teaching and Resources Project — with the World Bank on Tuesday, February 23, to improve the education sector in the state of Nagaland, according to a statement from the Ministry of Finance.

Around 1.5 lakh students 20,000 teachers throughout Nagaland are expected to benefit from this according project, aforementioned statement.

\$68-million loan, obtained from International Bank Reconstruction Development (IBRD), will mature in 14.5 years and will be awarded an additional : Pavithra Prabhu grace period of five years.

The ministry statement also highlighted the objectives of the project, which includes enhancing governance, teaching practices learning environments of schools in Nagaland.

At least 15 of the 44 higher-secondary existing schools in Nagaland are expected to be revamped as part of the project.

It also has provisions to improve schools, advancements in said the statement.

## India now focuses on wellness: PM

### Teachers protest fee cut

BENGALURU: At least 3,000 educators from across the city banded together to participate in a peaceful and : march from Bengaluru Central Railway Station to Freedom Park in Bengaluru on Tuesday, February 23, against the slashing of private school fees by 30 percent.

The protest, organised by the Karnataka Private School technological: Managements, Teaching and Non-Teaching Staff Coordination Committee



(KPMTCC), led to Karnataka Minister for Primary & Secondary Education, S Suresh Kumar, visiting the teachers and assuring them he would "talk to parents and school heads" on the issue.

"It is not right that the government is not supporting us. It is unfair treatment,"

said one teacher from Royal: International Concorde School who was participating in the project.

Although the KPMTCC initially suggested a 15percent cut, it was withdrawn and the organisation now demands that the order for 30 percent fee cut be revoked.

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#### Climate change hits low-income nations worst

t least 24.9 million people from 140 **L** countries were displaced and 34 million people across the globe were lacking sufficient quantities of nutritious and affordable food due to climate extremes in 2019, the United Nations Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs (OCHA) has said in a statement.

"People living in lowincome countries are at least four times more likely to be displaced by extreme weather compared to people in rich countries, despite being the



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least responsible for climate change," said OCHA. The UN has issued a warning about climate extremes and said

anticipation and planning are required to deal with weather-related hazards.

These hazards have put millions of lives at risk and they require urgent assistance.

As a result of humaninduced climate change. natural disasters in the past 20 years have doubled and claimed nearly 1.23 million lives, it said.

Countries like Sudan, Yemen, Afghanistan, Zimbabwe, and Bangladesh were dreadfully affected by climate changeit claimed. Sudan experienced devastating floods in 2020. Yemen and other countries in North Africa suffer from safe water shortage.

In 2018, many Afghans were displaced due to severe drought, said the statement.
